






Four simple FPP blocks released quarterly to make one 25" square quilt center!





Make one block and add simple borders or make many blocks!








## Halloween Adventures A Foundation Paper Pieced Quilt Marianne Jeffrey

#### Tutorial: DIY Block Design

Foundation paper piecing block design isn't complicated!, it is especially easy if you stick to the relatively simple quilt elements such as half square triangles, flying geese etc.

Fundamentally an FPP block is a square with 1/4 inch seam allowance added around the outside, like this


Now let us analyse this simple quilt block...







It is simply a diagonal line across your FPP pattern.

When you create two patterns one with the diagonal line going upwards to the left and one with the line upwards to the right you can place the resulting blocks together to create interacting design elements for quilt borders!






All you really need to determine is what point at the edge of the block the lines will emanate from and what point on the opposite side of the block will it finish at.




To do this a useful way to envision your paper as divided into a 9 patch

Then you can simply rule a line from the one side to the other using the block divisions as a guide.







And of course do another block with the line in the opposite orientation.



You then have two easy foundation paper piecing patterns for interacting border elements!

Here's another example: triangle in a square block.







To do this a useful way to envision your paper as divided into a 4 patch that way you know where the center point is.

Then you can simply rule a line from the bottom left corner to the centre of the block across the top.








Repeat that process to draw a line from the bottom right corner to the center at the top of the block.




You then have a useful FPP pattern for the triangle in a square block.

## I have provided two printable 5" blocks with 1/4" seam allowance added!

This first one features the 9 patch shadow to help you envision the points of division that could be used at the edge of the block to guide your line ruling.



This second printable 5" FPP block features the 4 patch shadow to help you envision the points of division that could be used at the edge of the block to guide your line ruling.



Here are some example block ideas to get you started with imagining how to divide the block up into sections to create quilt block patterns that can add pizzazz to any quilt design!
